***Re: Duty to report suspected offences - section 465 of the Legal Profession Uniform Law***

I refer to the above and to my affidavit as sworn on 12<sup>th</sup> March 2022; a copy of which was provided to you on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2022, and with such affidavit laying out succinctly the fraudulent activities of Terence Goldberg of Turner Freeman Lawyers. I **enclose** a copy of such for the purposes of reference.


I (once again) bring your attention to sections 465(2)(a) and 465(2)(b) of the *Legal Profession Uniform Law* (NSW) (“**LPUL**”) which provides for and states that you must report suspected offences to the NSW Police and make available the relevant documentation when doing so.

In the latter part of 2015 you were interviewed by the NSW Police as part of an investigation into Terence Goldberg’s fraudulent conduct. Needless to say, had you informed the NSW Police that the Enmore Spiritualist Church Incorporated was not Turner Freeman’s client (in Supreme Court proceedings 2009/00291458), it is obvious that Mr Goldberg and others would have been charged with a number of counts of fraud.

I am minded to believe that your present reluctance to perform your correct and proper duties in accordance with sections 465(2)(a) and 465(2)(b) of the LPUL is because you were untruthful during your interview with the NSW Police in the first instance.

We need to understand as to how you advised the NSW Police in such interview in the latter part of 2015, and I await your response.
